



Brothers Redevelopment builds programs to meet Colorado's housing needs

With the help of our incredible partners, supporters, Board of Directors, staff and volunteers, Brothers Redevelopment in 2018 made tremendous strides in delivering services.

We started 2018 in a big way by breaking ground on Paris Family Apartments in Aurora, a

shining example of how bringing together many great and diverse partners, including the city of Aurora, Arapahoe County, the Colorado Division of Housing and CHFA, can make the nearly impossible happen.

When it opens this summer, this 39-unit community will become our 14th affordable community and offer new and attractive two- and three-bedroom apartments to low-income families in the city's historic northwest neighborhoods. The \$13 million complex on a half-acre site, 1702 Paris St., also will link residents to services and opportunities, from job training and employment to after-school tutoring and mentoring.

Big-picture partnerships also were key in Brothers' winning a \$2 million grant from the Colorado Department of Transportation to preserve and protect historic working-class neighborhoods in Globeville Elyria-Swansea — an urgent need amid a massive reconstruction of Interstate 70 and the myriad redevelopment projects around it.

The innovative GES Affordable Housing Collaborative includes Brothers, community members in the GES Coalition and the Colorado Community Land Trust. The collaborative will acquire homes for placement in the neighborhood land trust and develop other single- and multifamily housing. This effort will provide attainable homes for dozens of families while maintaining the neighborhood's character and local control.

Brothers always keeps the big picture in view with its Aging in Place Initiative, a massive push that continues to weave together resources and services for Colorado's aging population. We enable senior individuals and persons with disabilities to safely stay in their homes—as most of them wish to do—by serving as both guide and glue in the Front Range services network.

Brothers' strong legacy programs, Home Modification and Repair and volunteer-fueled Paint-A-Thon, continue to wield hammers and brushes to make homes more sound and suitable — at no charge to homeowners. These long-trusted programs have strengthened old partnerships and forged new ones with cities and community organizations, which increasingly rely on us for more

projects. Our foundational HMR program completed the most extensive projects list in its long history. Paint-A-Thon was stronger than ever in its 40th year, managing 2,183 volunteers and completing 117 projects.

HMR and Paint-A-Thon also continued their rapid expansion of services into Colorado Springs and El Paso County and are now entering nearby mountain communities along the I-70 corridor.

After helping clients make their homes safer, we can also help them thrive in their homes. Our Senior Services Coordination program ensures older Coloradans have all benefits due them. It offers information on all topics related to their well-being, and it locates for them the best providers of available social services and other aid and opportunities.

Brothers' award-winning consumer education and counseling programs help Coloradans of all ages manage their finances and attain and maintain housing. Our workshops, in-person sessions and online classes saw record attendance in 2018. The Housing Counseling program prepares residents for everything from responsible renting to first-time home buying. Our statewide housing helpline, Colorado Housing Connects (1-844-926-6632), answers all the questions asked by renters, homeowners and landlords. We steer all comers toward potential housing solutions.

Brothers helps Coloradans search for appropriate housing, taking a very direct role with its increasingly successful Landlords Opening Doors (LOD) program. Working with the Colorado Department of Health Care Policy and Finance and the Colorado Division of Housing, LOD placed nearly 150 well-prepared tenants from the state's Colorado Choice Transitions and other voucher programs with metro area property owners and managers. The private sector also stepped up to help with this innovative effort last year, with the program seeing generous financial support in late 2018 from the Apartment Association of Metro Denver.

Brothers also has been very busy administering the City and County of Denver's Temporary Rental and Utility Assistance (TRUA) program, which helps Denverites avoid eviction and other housing and utility budget shortfalls. In the first program year, Brothers provided \$766,414 in rental and utility assistance to 566 of the city's struggling renter households.

We are grateful that our funders and supporters continue to trust us and, recognizing our effective, unique and pivotal role in housing, they are helping us broaden and deepen Brothers Redevelopment's programming and reach.



That's why we've created our Aging in Place Initiative — a comprehensive approach to providing older Coloradans with answers, services, programs, benefits

Brothers' Senior Services Coordination can help the elderly meet any and all challenges. Our navigators and counselors ensure that seniors can discover and attain the best services and benefits available to them, from recreational and social programs to financial counseling. Brothers guides seniors through their options and eligibility for programs.

Brothers directly provides senior homeowners a long list of housing-related services at no charge, such as exterior painting, essential repairs and modifications that enhance safety and accessibility in their homes. Brothers' lauded legacy programs, Home Modification and Repair and Paint-A-Thon, only expand and grow stronger each year.

Through the end of Fiscal Year 2018, Brothers Senior Service Coordination worked with almost 2,300 seniors, answering questions, providing helpful information and connecting them with more than 5,000 services. About 500 clients enjoyed quantifiable benefits or savings of nearly \$650,000. Some of the greatest savings were realized in the areas of medical expenses and nutrition.

Brothers' Aging in Place programs provided savings for the entire community. For every \$2 in grants, about \$9 were saved or gained by the recipients of services.

- Coordinators assist clients with applying for benefits and other services, such as Social Security, Veterans and other federal and state benefits.
- Brothers' Counseling and Education pros inform on all housing-related financial topics. They also can help with other topics, such as living wills, identity-theft protection, powers of attorney, financial planning and budgeting.
- Coordinators can facilitate food assistance, house-cleaning services, yard work, health care, transportation

the volunteer-powered program that paints 100 or more house exteriors each March through September for income-eligible seniors and our neighbors with disabilities.

In 2018, our 40th Anniversary, we pulled out all the stops and painted 117 homes. And it was fun for everybody. But we'll let our clients do the talking about why Paint-A-Thon is so valuable and lovable.

Ms. Garcia in Denver said: "The house is beautiful — the yard trimmed and manicured — and I am once again proud of my home. The stress has been removed ... the facelift enhances my neighborhood."

Because a funny thing happens when the paint flies neighbors and our volunteers spread their wings and the whole block is lifted up.

Ms. Reynolds in Lakewood said: "I was so ashamed of my house that I wouldn't talk to my neighbors. (Now) I feel tremendously good about myself. I am proud and overwhelmed. The house is so beautiful."

Under Brothers' management, our trained volunteers paint the house exterior, remove yard debris, make minor exterior repairs and do some trimming and minor landscaping. This saves homeowners upward of \$5,000 that they can spend on other essentials.

As one homeowner said: "The Paint-A-Thon has restored hope and pride in where we live. The staff was hard-working, but yet so sweet and easy to talk to. Thank you. Now every time I drive up to my home, I smile."

Paint-A-Thon is not just about how great your house will look.

One homeowner pointed out about painting: "My house looks beautiful, but more importantly, the work done preserves the exterior and ensures it will stand up to adverse weather and the intensity of the sun for years to come! ... I am so happy with the results!"

Ms. Adams said: "It has also reinforced that there are wonderful people and programs to help people like myself — what a wonderful program."

One last point of view from Mr. Maul before you hopefully nominate a friend, neighbor or family member for Paint-A-Thon: "It has shown me that there are great people that will take their own time to volunteer and help people they don't even know what a wonderful group of people."

Home Modification & Repair crews get around ... Helping you get around

Over five decades Brothers Redevelopment's Home Modification and Repair (HMR) Department has repaired tens of thousands of Front Range homes owned by the elderly and persons with disabilities.

We can make all the difference to homeowners hoping to age in place.

A homeowner in Arvada told us we delivered "less stress" to her doorstep. "(HMR) eased my fear of steps and falling. It's easier for me to get up and down stairs, in and out the front and back doors. Such an awesome program with great employees and subcontractors. The group did a first-class job on my ramp and stairs. ... I would recommend your services to anybody."

HMR is anchored by strong partnerships with local governments that know the value of our programs for individuals and entire neighborhoods. These civic entities fund our Help for Homes, Home Rehabilitation and Home Modification programs, which improve residential safety and accessibility and address aging-home concerns. These programs help maintain a city's housing stock and property values.

Because we strive to help disabled and elderly Coloradans maintain their homes and enable them to age in place despite any physical and financial limitations, the repairs are generally completed at no cost to them, or at a significantly discounted cost.

HMR has continued its rapid expansion of services into Colorado Springs and El Paso County and is now entering nearby mountain communities along the I-70 corridor.

"It has been a blessing to have safety issues taken care of as my husband is partially blind," Ms. Aguilar of Colorado Springs told us. "Having sufficient lighting, grab bars in the bathroom, handrails in the halls and walkways fixed — things we never could have paid for out of pocket on our fixed incomes — thank you, Brothers, for everything you did in our home!"

Brothers Redevelopment coordinates a wide variety of repairs and modifications that enable residents with disabilities or physical limitations to avoid injury and enjoy increased mobility.

Brothers Redevelopment works to promote, preserve and protect homeownership.

Certified by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) as a comprehensive housing counseling agency, Brothers Redevelopment offers:

Counseling and/or classes on housing-related topics, including budgeting, responsible renting, renters rights, building credit, housing searches and more.

Renter to Homeowner classes help tenants navigate the transition to ownership.

- Homebuyer Workshops explain the home-buying process from start to finish. All sessions are provided in English and Spanish — at no fee to client.
- Certificate of Home Buyer Education: After completing one-to-one counseling or workshop requirements, clients can obtain a Certificate of Homebuyer Education.
- Online Homebuyers Education, eHome America, is a convenient alternative for those who can't find time to attend class (client fee).
- Default Mortgage Counseling helps homeowners in danger of falling behind on mortgages (no fee).
- Reverse Mortgage Counseling is for seniors who wish to tap the equity in their home while aging in place.

Landlords Opening Doors

is Brothers' initiative with landlords willing to consider the applications of tenants who have recovered from severe health problems and other challenges and are now able to live on their own, if given a chance.

Brothers Redevelopment recruits landlords in 29 counties to rent to residents in transition. Many of these tenants have the backing of one of the state's strongest safety-net programs, Colorado Choice Transitions, which assists select members of Health First Colorado (Colorado's Medic-promote attainable housing. aid program).

In March 2018 Brothers Redevelopment began construction of the \$13 million Paris Family Apartments at 1702 Paris St.

Paris will offer 39 affordable two- and three-bedroom units on a half-acre site in the heart of Aurora's northwest neighborhoods. This pioneering project also will feature wraparound services for its resident families, from after-school tutoring and mentoring to job training and employment opportunities.





Neighborhood Preservation

Globeville Elyria-Swansea Affordable Housing Collaborative

Brothers Redevelopment received a landmark \$2 million grant in 2018 from the Colorado Department of Transportation to preserve affordable housing and historic community identity and values in the Globeville Elyria-Swansea neighborhood of Denver — an area in the middle of Interstate 70 reconstruction and other massive redevelopment.

A grassroots effort to enable neighbors to determine and guide their own best futures led to the innovative GES Affordable Housing Collaborative. It includes Brothers, community members in the GES Coalition and the Colorado Community Land Trust. The collaborative will acquire homes for placement in the neighborhood land trust and develop other single- and multifamily housing. This effort will provide attainable homes for dozens of local families while maintaining the neighborhood's character.





And Brothers knows it can work to preserve other historic, distinctive neighborhoods.
